#### Club President

Dear Members:

What an exciting season this has been. The new Education Centre was opened 1 December 2018 by the Shire Mayor, Mick Wolfe, and our local State Member of Parliament, Roma Britnell. The Club now has an ample dry training area which includes the latest audio visual aids, air conditioning and adequate tables and chairs for class room type training. Below this room, the equipment storage and lifesaving operations space has been doubled and is far better organized with shelving for storage. In all a very pleasing result. This was possible through fund raising efforts over several years, and the generous help of several benefactors, donors and sponsors. I take this opportunity to thank them all – we could not have achieved all of this without your financial help. Thank you for supporting us. A list of sponsors and supporters is provided on pages 26 and 27 of this report. Well done Paul Buchanan for coordinating the project as Project Officer.

On the beachside of the clubhouse, the Moyne Shire has carried out major landscaping works. Many have been wondering what is going on. Let me assure the concerned public that these works will help mitigate the effects of coastal erosion on the foreshore and in particular the clubhouse. In addition, an all-weather access ramp from the car parking area to the beach has been provided. This will allow Club and emergency vehicles easy access to the sand level. An "accessible" footpath and wheel chair ramp to the beach has been provided in the works. Also included is a concrete slab for a new patrol platform that gives an excellent view of the patrolled area. Further, the Moyne Shire proposes to upgrade the adjacent car park area and Hughes Street to provide more parking and better access. New toilet blocks will also be built. These works are proposed to be carried out over the next few years.

Beach attendance during patrol times was 5,943 and a total 2,206 patrol hours were provided by Club volunteer members. Paid lifeguards also patrolled in January during weekdays. The beach was patrolled during the season without any major incident. Thank you patrol Captains Bob Beekhof, Shaun Murrihy, Scott Cooper, Scott Hetherington and your teams for making the beach safe. Dean Dwyer patrolled 109.50 hours this season – thank you Dean for your fine volunteering effort.

Training has been more organised this season through using our new Education Centre and with the increase in size of the equipment storage space below. Thirteen Bronze Medallions and eight Surf Rescue Certificates were awarded. Also, the new points of access to the beach from the new patrol platform is making beach patrolling more friendly and functional. Thank you Club Captain and Chief Instructor, Shaun Murrihy, for leading the Club with training and beach patrols.

Membership stood at 651, with Nipper members at 460. This is a large number of 7 to 13 year-olds to manage on the beach. The Club had an exciting Nipper program from December to February. I thank Nicole and her band of 50 or more age-managers and helpers.

Our two boat crews did well at carnivals: the Shearwaters (men) and Firebirds (women) crews - at state carnivals and the Australian Surf Life Saving Championships in Queensland.

The Club had a successful presentation night on 10 May. This year the President's Award went to Shaun Murrihy who provided such drive and initiative to get the Club moving in the operations area. Thank you Shaun, we appreciate how much you have done.

On behalf of the Club, I express deep regret concerning the loss of life of two Port Campbell members at Easter time. Ross and Andy Powell were dynamic members of their club. Our thoughts are with club members, the immediate family and friends.

To the Board of Directors – thank you for your time spent in managing the Club: an onerous but rewarding task. All Club members appreciate your efforts.





State inspectors passed all our IRB gear on 16/11/2018 and has been updated on the LSV database. Our trailers were rotated throughout the season. They were used for the:



## Nipper Co-ordinator

Nippers continued to move forward in season 2018-19 with record attendance of approximately 460 registered Nippers. Our first session was 9th December and we concluded on the 24th February. Every registered Nipper received a welcome pack, which included a swim bag, shopping bag, pencil case and drink bottle. Thanks to the sponsorship of the Port Fairy & District Community Bank Branch and our local IGA Supermarket for these items. There were 15 sessions in total and there is absolutely no way we can successfully run a program catering for these numbers without a lot of help. The highlight of the season for me has been how many people have been willing to volunteer their assistance.

Thanks to the efforts of our volunteer helpers and family members, we again managed to get through the whole summer without any major incidents involving our Nippers.

Safety remained our main priority and we ensured that we complied with all safety measures as required by LSV.

We again were blessed with good conditions for our Sunday and Friday night sessions that contributed to the large numbers of enthusiastic youngsters taking part. Our aim as always is to increase our Nippers' water safety and surf knowledge whilst enjoying a fun and friendly atmosphere. East Beach was again a sea of pink, green and orange as our Nippers were joined by great numbers of both qualified and trainee water safety people. The pink vests along with their colour age caps enable us to easily spot an athlete under the water, whilst the other colours make it much easier for myself and our Age Managers to ensure we have the required number of helpers for each activity.

A few of the highlights this season included Friday night twilight sessions, the Australia Day Carnival, our own Club championships days and let us not forget the fresh fruit and a sausage in bread! We are proud to be a "soft drink free" Club.

In particular, I would like to thank our Age Managers and Water Safety people. Further, I thank Dean Dwyer who helped set up each week and our IRB drivers. I also appreciate the many others who assisted in other areas, administration, merchandise, fruit cutters and let's not forget the BBQ team!!

We certainly value the input from all those that contribute to our program and encourage all interested parties to put their hands up and ask how they can help – with the numbers now attending our program it's more important than ever that we have as many volunteers as possible.

The Shearwaters, composed of Paul Buchanan, Dean Dwyer, Shaun Murrihy, Greg Dalton and Scott Hetherington, took on the challenging surf on the Monday of the carnival. The first two races they finished fourth and first. The surf rating was reassessed and the call was made to make helmets compulsory which was probably a good decision as the Shearwaters rolled on the nasty first sandbar in their third round race. After a scramble to re-right the capsized boat and make it back out around the cans before the 8-minute time limit, the Shearwaters thought their campaign was over. Fortunately, they scraped into the semi-finals by one point!

A great start off the beach, through the challenging surf where two others boats rolled over, the Shearwaters were able to save some energy ready to give everything they had for the upcoming final, finishing second when they hit the beach.

The Shearwaters were up against some formidable, strong clubs like Nth Cronulla, Maroochydore, Bilgola, and Mollymook. Having beaten Nth Cronulla and Bilgola in earlier races, the Shearwaters were confident they could take it up to them. However, the final race was not to be the Shearwaters best race. They did not have the best starts off the beach and could not find the form they had earlier to row any of the teams down. All the boys were disappointed with their efforts but on reflection, it was an amazing effort to once again finish in the top six clubs in Australia. The Shearwaters have travelled around Australia to compete in eight national championships and have made the final four times. By the time the Firebirds got Brooke into the boat and retrieved the oar the time limit was almost up. Their campaign was over. Both the Firebirds and support crew were disappointed because the surf dictated the results and I am sure that had all things been equal, the Firebirds could have ended up with different results. Nevertheless, that is why we call it surfboat racing. The Firebirds also can hold their heads up, as they are Victorian 180 years champions and State and National Finalists. Education Centre:

The official opening of our 'Education Centre' by Mayor of Moyne shire, Mick Wolfe and Local MP Roma Britnall on 12 December 2019 was the culmination of some mighty efforts in both fundraising and project management. The major project donors, trades and businesses involved listed below demonstrate the community commitment to this project. The result has received widespread commendation for the workmanship, design, versatility and functionality of the new addition to our Club building. It is clear that the centre will have long-term benefits for the membership and ability of our Club to serve our community through lifesaving education and training.

Equipment Storage:

Beach access and patrol viewing platform:
